## Select Board Meeting Meeting February 17, 2026

### A. 5:00 PM – Open meeting / Roll Call

Chairman Harry Seidel called the meeting to order at 5:04 PM.

**Select Board Present:** Harry Seidel and Vice Chair Alfred Hanson

**Not Present at Roll Call:** Mike Smith

### B. Non-public Session, RSA 91-A:3 II (b) The hiring of any person as a public employee.

**Moved:** Seidel **Second:** Hanson Roll call vote: Seidel: Yes Hanson: Yes Motion Passed

The Board went into non-public at 5:05 pm.

### C. 6:00 pm – Re-open meeting / Roll Call / Pledge of Allegiance

Harry Seidel called the public meeting to order at 6:02 PM. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

### D. PUBLIC HEARING

1. To Hear Public Input on a citizen petition: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 32:5-b, and implement a tax cap whereby the governing body (or budget committee) shall not submit a recommended budget that increases the amount to be raised by local taxes, based on the prior fiscal year's actual amount of local taxes raised, by more than 4%? (Submitted by Petition for the 2026 Annual Town Warrant)

Harry Seidel opened the public hearing at 6:04 PM & opened the floor to public comment and questions.

Bob LaFrance of Collins Road asked if the 4% is per year. Mike Smith stated that the way he reads it, it means the budget cannot exceed an increase of more than 4%.

James Sherman of New Market Road stated that this year the Select Board and Budget Committee worked hard to keep the budget low. He explained that the Town's percentage of the total tax rate is roughly 31% and the Town cannot control the remaining 69%. James Sherman stated that 2015 through 2025 the overall expenses in Warner increased annually 1.89% and capital increased 3%. James Sherman stressed that the increase is in the portion of the tax rate that the town cannot control. James Sherman explained that the largest increase came from the school. He noted that from 2015 through 2025 the school portion of the tax rate increased 76% and the town's portion increased 23%. James Sherman explained that the cost to the school per student in 2017 was \$20,000 and in 2023 it was \$30,000 and he feels it is a tremendous increase. James Sherman explained that the State is not able to give towns and schools as much support as it has in the past. He referred to the elimination of the interest and dividends tax, reduced business tax and the elimination of the income cap for school vouchers. James Sherman explained that 65% of public services are covered by

1 property tax. He stated that the state has put a moratorium on school building aid, reduced the rooms and  
2 meals tax distribution and revenue sharing. James Sherman commended the Select Board for being  
3 conscientious when crafting the next town budget. He referenced the 14% increase in health insurance,  
4 drastic increase in ambulance service cost to at \$266,000, the increase in funds to the library at \$435,000 due  
5 to the increased total town assessment, and high legal fees. James Sherman stated that a 4% tax cap would  
6 result in drastic changes in the Town of Warner for services. Mike Smith thanked James Sherman for his  
7 presentation.

8 No further public comment was offered.

9 Harry Seidel closed the public hearing at 6:15 PM.

10 The Select Board had no further comment.

11

12 **Select Board Vote: Not recommend: 2-1**

13 **Alfred Hanson: not recommend Harry Seidel: not recommend**

14 **Mike Smith: recommend the 4% tax cap.**

15

16 Mike Smith informed the Select Board that the agenda posted says January 17<sup>th</sup> and it should read February  
17 17<sup>th</sup>. He questioned if this is a legal meeting. He stated that he brought this up but he did not hear back from  
18 anyone. Mike Smith did not respond when asked who he brought it up to and stated that he is looking for  
19 guidance. Martha Mical and James Sherman both stated that the agenda and public hearing were correctly  
20 posted at the Library and the newspaper making the issue moot. The Select Board agreed that it was a typo  
21 and the meeting will proceed.

22

23 **The Select Board voted to close the public hearing, Roll Call Vote Hanson YES Smith YES Seidel YES**

24 Harry Seidel closed the public hearing at 6:24 PM

26 **E. Select Board Business:**

27 **1. Department Heads:**

28 **a. Department of Public Works, Town of Warner Tree Policy TABLED**

29

30 **b. Transfer Station, Department of Labor (DOL) Report**

31 Harry Seidel explained that the DOL is willing to work with the town on items that they would like to see  
32 improved. Herm Blanchette Director of Public Works updated the Select Board on the steps being taken.

33

34 **Well/Water:** Herm Blanchette explained that the well at the transfer station that feeds the Highway Garage  
35 and the State Shed needs to be addressed. He explained that the water testing results show that it is very high  
36 in chloride, manganese and iron. Herm Blanchette informed the Select Board that the prices for water  
37 filtering are approximately \$4,000 per facility and then \$150/month per facility. Herm Blanchette stated that  
38 for the time being he has signed up with Monadnock Spring Water to deliver 5 gallon bottles/bubbler at a  
39 cost of \$100/month. Harry Seidel asked if the State has been contacted regarding sharing the cost of a new  
40 well. Herm Blanchette stated that is his plan for a long term solution. Alfred Hanson stated that even with a  
41 new well there will still be salt. Herm Blanchette explained that he will review the well contract and contact  
42 the State. The bubblers are the short term solution and the DOL is agreeable.

43

44 **MSDS:** Herm Blanchette explained that the Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) are being updated for  
45 posting.

46 **Steel plates:** The steel plates for the loading dock need to be replaced, he received a quote for \$4,000

47

48 **Lighting:** Herm Blanchette inquired if the Select Board received bids for the upgrade of lighting. Harry  
49 Seidel explained that a bid has been received from KLM for replacing the light fixtures. Ed Mical suggested  
50 contacting Eversource to consider an energy grant.

1  
2 **c. Health Inspector:**

3 Elizabeth Labbe informed the Select Board that the State needs the Board's signature on a form assigning the  
4 responsibilities of the Warner Health Inspector Chris Lopez to satisfy the state term expiration of the position  
5 that differs from the Town. Nancy Martin stated that she has learned that the Warner health inspector is not  
6 certified which puts limitations on him. Nancy Martin questioned if it is possible to have him certified.  
7 Elizabeth Labbe will do some research.  
8

9 **d. Audit Proposals for 2025: Two Proposals for Review**

10 Harry Seidel explained that two proposals were received from auditing firms. He noted that the proposals are  
11 very different in scope. Harry Seidel recapped the proposals.

12 **Veroff CPA:** is a small firm that mainly serves small towns like Dalton NH. The cost is \$10,750

13 **Vachon Clukay:** has served Warner in the past. Harry Seidel explained that Vachon Clukay helped the town  
14 when it was in a challenging situation. He explained that Vachon Clukay submitted a good report for the  
15 town with two items to improve (the MS434 and issuance of debit cards). Alfred Hanson asked how many  
16 towns Vachon Clukay serves. Harry Seidel recapped many of their clients. The cost is \$34,250.  
17

18 Alfred Hanson explained his concerns regarding the Veroff proposal. He stated that Veroff has very few  
19 clients and the bid is extremely low. Harry Seidel supports Vachon Clukay. Mike Smith stated that he has  
20 not had enough time to review all the material. Alfred Hanson explained that the decision does not need to  
21 be made tonight.  
22

23 David Carle suggested contacting the clients of Veroff CPA. Harry Seidel explained that he would like to  
24 select Vachon Clukay because they were there for Warner in a time of need. The Select Board agreed to  
25 revisit the discussion at the next meeting.  
26

27 **2. Rules of Procedure**

28 Harry Seidel explained that the Select Board has been reviewing suggested amendments to their Rules of  
29 Procedure. He stated that members of the community made an effort to submit amendments because they  
30 noticed that processes were not smooth. He stated that they felt that accountability, respect, integrity and  
31 cooperation could be increased and improved in the process that the Select Board uses. Harry Seidel  
32 explained that the amendments have been reviewed and need to be adopted. He explained that the Select  
33 Board can make changes that they feel necessary. Harry Seidel explained that the Chair of the ZBA and  
34 members of the Planning Board have submitted a few edits.

35 Harry stated proposed edits.

36 **Page 1** Assignments of Select Board members to boards and commissions. Harry Seidel explained that there  
37 is not a Select Board ex officio member on the Zoning Board.

38 **Page 3** Select Board posting insert RSA 91.

39 **Page 11** Harry Seidel explained that Bob Holmes suggested inserting New Hampshire Municipal Association  
40 Legal Services for a resource for a legal opinion.

41 **Page 13** Committees/Liaisons: Harry Seidel explained that Barb Marty (Zoning Chair) questioned the  
42 amendment that gives the Select Board the ability to appoint an employee to be an ex officio, non-voting  
43 member. He explained that she is questioning what if the employee does not want to serve. Harry Seidel  
44 suggested adding "with their consent".

45 **Page 14** Harry Seidel explained that Bob Holmes recommended corrections to a few typos. Removal of a  
46 hyphen and capitalizing letters.

47 **Page 17** insert if "if an issue or matter is discovered"  
48

49 **Harry Seidel made a motion seconded by Alfred Hanson to approve the final version of the Select**  
50 **Board Rules of Procedure as amended on February 17, 2026. Roll Call Vote Hanson YES Smith YES**  
51 **Seidel YES**

1 Harry Seidel thanked the members of the community for their efforts.

### 3. Cell Tower Update TABLED

4 Harry Seidel explained that additional information is still needed. He explained that it has been difficult to  
5 get the pricing of the repeaters. He noted that the height of the tower is crucial. The Select Board agreed to  
6 table the discussion.

### 4. RSA 31:105, Primex Recommendations

8 Harry Seidel explained that the New Hampshire Municipal Association has given a legal opinion that Warner  
9 should indemnify under RSA 31:105 increasing the level of insurance. He stated that currently Warner is  
10 covered under RSA 31:106. Harry Seidel explained that it is unlikely but adopting this could cause the Town  
11 to need additional insurance. Elizabeth Labbe explained that the attorney is referring to a situation where if  
12 Primex does not cover a claim, the Town agrees to step in and pay. Harry Seidel stated that NHMA  
13 recommends adopting RSA 31:105. The Select Board agreed to hold off on making a decision allowing the  
14 Select Board members time to think about it.

### 5. Town Land Sale Policy (Draft) TABLED

17 Harry Seidel explained that he collaborated with residents of Warner to draft the policy. He stated that the  
18 RSA's have fallen behind the case law. Harry Seidel explained that he has spoken to Christine Last Name?  
19 from NHMA who forward two edits. He explained that he needs to incorporate the two edits and bring the  
20 draft policy back to another meeting. David Carle stated that at the last meeting Mike Smith stated that he  
21 has the policy that is currently in place. David Carle stated that it would be hard to consider a new policy  
22 without reviewing the old policy. Mike Smith explained that he has the approved minutes and votes from a  
23 former Select Board. He stated that he received the information from Judy Newman-Rogers. Mike Smith  
24 advised the Select Board that Jonathan Lord in the past utilized the policy. Judy Newman-Rogers agreed she  
25 had given Mike Smith the information she had and that Mike Smith stated at the previous meeting that he  
26 would forward that information that he has. Judy Newman-Rogers said she had not received the information.  
27 Mike Smith stated that he will forward what he has but would not have access to his desk where for another  
28 week.

31 Harry Seidel explained that it was his understanding that in April 2021 a policy was drafted but meeting  
32 minutes do not show a vote between April 2021 and May 2022. Mike Smith stated that this Select Board can  
33 vote to adopt or change the policy. Harry Seidel read the recommendations from the NHMA:

34 Suggestion #1 pertains to Section 4C: *please note that RSA 80:80, III requires that whenever the*  
35 *Select board uses as justice may require the authority to dispose of tax dedeed property it first must by an*  
36 *affirmative vote find that disposal by this method other than sealed bid or public auction is in the best*  
37 *interest of the public.*

38  
39 Suggested edit #2 pertains to Section 2A: *specifying that the Select Board will review the applicable*  
40 *statutory procedures for the sale of that particular property before doing anything further.*

42 Harry Seidel reiterated that Christine from NHMA has reviewed the draft policy and today she said the draft  
43 policy was great and recommended editing Section 4C and Section 2A. Harry Seidel noted that he  
44 questioned the 3-year time line for reimbursing the property owner for the difference between what is owed  
45 to the Town and the sale price. Martha Mical explained that in the past the Town has always kept the  
46 property for at least three years to avoid having to reimburse the difference. The Select Board agreed to table  
47 this for further review.

### 6. Select Board Recommend/Not Recommend on Citizen Petitions

49 a. **Outsource Payroll:** *“Shall the town vote to require the Select Board to outsource Payroll to*  
50 *one of the three companies it received quotes from in 2025 (ADP, CheckmateHCM or Paychex)”*.

1 Harry Seidel acknowledged that other towns outsource payroll. He explained that Clyde Carson Finance  
2 Director uses a payroll system that integrated MTS the town's financial system and it is designed to meet the  
3 State of NH requirements. Harry Seidel stated that outsourcing payroll will save less than 12 hours per  
4 month and could cost the town at least \$10,000 in the operating budget.

5 **VOTE 2-1 Alfred Hanson: Not Recommend, Harry Seidel: Not Recommend, Mike Smith: Recommend**

6  
7 **b. Publish Annual Audit Report Online and Address Deficiencies at a Public meeting:**

8 *"Shall the town vote to require the Select Board to publish the annual town financial audit without redaction*  
9 *prominently on the town website within 7 days of receipt from town auditors and to further require the Select*  
10 *board to add a standing agenda item to their public meeting to address deficiencies reported by the*  
11 *Auditors". Harry Seidel explained that the audit report is available on the town's website.*

12 **VOTE 2-1 Alfred Hanson: Not Recommend, Harry Seidel: Not Recommend, Mike Smith: Recommend**

13  
14 **c. Support Public Input and Extra Time for a Mountain Bike Trail in Rollins State Park**  
15 **on Mount Kearsarge**

16 Town of Warner Citizen's Petition, construction of a multi-use downhill mountain bike trail on Mount  
17 Kearsarge. *Whereas Warner taxpayers deserve the opportunity to provide input in the decision by the*  
18 *Statewide Trails Advisory Committee (STAC) to allow construction of a mountain bike trail at Rollins Park*  
19 *and state forest on Mount Kearsarge. Whereas no botanical or biological inventory has been conducted*  
20 *along the proposed trail routes and whereas no safety plan has been devised for this steep endro-sytle trial in*  
21 *the semi-wilderness landscape of Mount Kearsarge and whereas adjacent and nearby landowners have*  
22 *expressed concern about the subsequent unauthorized creation of spider trails onto private lands the scarcity*  
23 *of State resources to address this type of trespass. Whereas additional time is needed to ensure meaningful*  
24 *public input by the residents at Warner's March 2026 annual town meeting. Are you in favor of respectfully*  
25 *urging that responsible state entities to deny further consideration of the current proposal until the above*  
26 *concerns and deficiencies have been met.*

27  
28 Alfred Hanson asked Nancy Martin for an update. Nancy Martin explained that the current State process  
29 does not allow for public input. She explained there is one public hearing at the end of the review process.  
30 She advised the Select Board that the intent was to ask for a delay until all the studies and an evaluation of  
31 the conditions on the mountain were done. Nancy Martin informed the Select Board that the group has gone  
32 ahead with the process and they will not be conducting any environmental studies. She stated that there is a  
33 plan to hold a site walk in the spring after the snow is gone but there is no telling where this will be in the  
34 process by then. Nancy Martin stated that this has to go before 4-6 different committees. She stressed that  
35 the residents of Warner have not been afforded an opportunity to weigh in. Harry Seidel explained that the  
36 Select Board sent a letter voicing their concerns. Nancy Martin stated that it is her hope that a vote at town  
37 meeting will be in opposition to the mountain bike trail. She did acknowledge that there are many who do  
38 support mountain bike trails. Nancy Martin spoke about the potential costs to the town for emergency  
39 services. Faith Minton explained that there is no exit off the mountain, which has been a longstanding safety  
40 concern. She spoke about the financial impact this will have on the taxpayers of Warner. Martha Mical  
41 stressed that the cost for the ambulance will fall on Warner. Martha Mical would like to see that the  
42 ambulance bills are sent to the person and not on the Town.

45 **d. Education Freedom Accounts**

46 Whereas, taxpayers have a right to know how their money is spent and deserve clear, verifiable evidence that  
47 it is being spent wisely and delivering results; and Whereas, taxpayer dollars are being diverted from public  
48 schools to private and religious education through Education Freedom Accounts (vouchers), and this shift  
49 does not reduce public school expenses, leaving local taxpayers to cover the difference through higher  
50 property taxes; and Whereas, unlike public schools, private education funded by taxpayers through vouchers

1 lacks key accountability measures, such as reporting how funds are used, tracking student performance,  
2 ensuring services for students with disabilities, and conducting background checks for staff. Therefore, we,  
3 the voters of Warner, New Hampshire, call on our state elected officials to uphold their duty to fiscal  
4 responsibility by rejecting taxpayer funding for private education until we have full accountability,  
5 transparency, and a sustainable funding plan that ensures no further strain on public schools or local property  
6 taxpayers. We further direct the Warner Select Board to deliver this warrant article and results in writing to  
7 New Hampshire's Governor and members of the State Legislature within 30 days of this vote.

8  
9 Faith Minton spoke in support of discussing this at Town Meeting. Mike Smith stated that he has  
10 not had enough time to form an opinion and he has gone “around and around on this”, he is unsure  
11 how to vote on this.

12 **VOTE 2-1 Alfred Hanson: Recommend, Harry Seidel: Recommend, Mike Smith: Not Recommend**

13  
14 **e. New Emergency Management Revolving Fund**

15 *Shall the Town vote to establish a revolving fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h, for the purpose of supporting*  
16 *Warner's Emergency Operations Center activities beyond the normal operating budget for Emergency*  
17 *Management, and furthermore to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 to come from the*  
18 *unassigned fund balance. All revenue received for services supported by this fund will be deposited*  
19 *into the fund, and the money in this fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not*  
20 *be considered part of the Town's General Fund Balance. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all*  
21 *monies in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Select Board and no further*  
22 *approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose*  
23 *for which the fund was created.*

25  
26 **f. Service Disability Tax Credit**

27 *Shall the Town of Warner vote in accordance with RSA 72:27-a to modify the provisions of RSA 72:35,*  
28 *previously adopted, for an optional tax credit of Two Thousand One Hundred and Fifty dollars (\$2,150) for a*  
29 *Service-Connected Total and Permanent Disability on residential property? If approved, this article shall*  
30 *take effect for the 2026 property tax year. Explanation: HB 99 (new law) prohibits veterans who qualify for the*  
31 *Optional Total and Permanent Service-Connected Disabled Tax Credit (the "T&D Credit") from also receiving*  
32 *the Optional Veterans' Tax Credit. These used to be stackable, meaning a qualifying disabled veteran would be*  
33 *able to access both credits. As a result, unless municipalities take action, qualifying veterans will see an increase*  
34 *in their property tax bills beginning with the 2026 tax year. Municipalities may prevent this unintended tax*  
35 *increase by raising the amount of the T&D Credit to replace the value of the Optional Veterans' Tax Credit that*  
36 *veterans will lose starting April 1, 2026. Increasing the T&D Credit to \$2,150 ensures that qualifying disabled*  
37 *veterans in Warner continue to receive a level of tax relief comparable to what they received prior to HB 99. This*  
38 *is done in the hopes that the Select Board recommends this action so that eligible veterans do not experience a net*  
39 *loss in their property tax credits because of the new law. The maximum allowable Optional T&D Credit has also*  
40 *been increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000 under the current statute.*
