January 30, 2024 Select Board Meeting Minutes

Open The Meeting and Roll Call

- Chair Seidel opened the meeting at 5:03 PM.
 - Present: Harry Seidel (Chair), Faith Minton, Allan Brown
 - Also Present: Butch Burbank, Clyde Carson, Judy Newman-Rogers, Georgia Flanders

Public Hearing- Citizen Petition for a 5-Member Select Board (Ballot Question on Election Day)

- Chair Seidel opened the public hearing.
 - Ballot Article: Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to five members?
- Sponsor: Christine Frost
 - Division of duties may be easier with five people on the board
 - Possibility of greater variety of expertise
 - Con: Less than a quorum not a legal meeting
 - May encourage conversations among board members that circumvents transparency
- Public Comment
 - Concerns regarding ability to persuade two more people to run were raised
 - Struggling to fill positions and retaining board members currently
 - Additional two \$3,300 stipends would create added budget expense
 - Criteria for running for Select Board?
 - Per RSA: Only requirement to run for an elected position is to be a registered voter in Town not within the town's authority to create criteria
 - Comment that may-be a possible RSA regulating size of board based on population
 - Town has been run well for many years with three selectmen and town administrator
 - Petition does not address term length, etc. (*Stated in RSA)
 - Information addressed on petition, but not available at public hearing
- Board discussion

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- May make board less efficient
 - Creates difficulty in running a meeting and keeping it moving
- Allan Brown moved not to recommend the article. Faith Minton seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Public Information Session: Community Power

- Clyde Carson gave a presentation to the board and assembled public regarding Community Power
 - Benefits include lower rates, clean energy options, community investment, and local control
 - Excess resources allocated back to the community
 - Coalition is statewide, and other towns in Merrimack County plan to go live later this year
 - Most customers with Eversource are automatically opted in
 - Net metered customers are the exception and will not be automatically enrolled
 - Community Power Coalition is working with the state to change this

- Participation is voluntary and opting out- or opting in if using a third-party supplier- is possible
- Warner Community Power is self-funded and no taxes will be used to cover program expenses
- Warner Community Power will become default power source for Warner customers
- Public discussion
 - Questions were raised regarding electric rates and reduction at Eversource
 - Reductions at DOE
 - Analysis of natural gas prices
 - Would be available to commercial customers as well, such as local businesses
 - Automatic opt-in?
 - Municipal Aggregation Act allows towns to shop for energy deals
 - RSA 53e
 - Creates another default service option
 - No minimum number of opt-ins
 - Community Power is the second-largest energy purchaser in NH aside from Eversource
 - The state allows Community Power to choose an opt-out model
 - Difficulty of opting out?
 - Easiest way to opt out is through the website
 - Can also opt out over the phone, but must have account number
 - Who reaps the benefits of surplus?
 - Use of surplus would be determined by the Selectboard
 - Surplus will not likely occur for several years
 - How is power acquired?
 - Concerns regarding natural disasters and sources of electricity
 - Power is purchased in a similar manner to utilities, but must have a high credit rate
 - This addresses issues with uncertain power supply
 - Community Power has been purchasing power for a relatively short time, but has steadily been building credit

Information Session: Warner Connects

- Allowing Warner Connects (Food Pantry and Family Closet) to occupy Warner Community Center rentfree
- Citizen Petition Warrant Article, will come before the town at town meeting
- Would hopefully promote discussion of the future of the community center
 - EDAC is currently working on estimates of costs to maintain community center
 - Info sessions will occur throughout 2024
 - Possible grant funding
 - Building is expensive to maintain, but the services are vital
- The food pantry serves a very large number of households in Warner
- 13,291.5 meals in one year
- The building is old, but strong
- Initiatives for town professionals to donate time and energy to bring the building up to code?
 Liability issues would be present regardless
- Family Closet financial support allows Food Pantry to pay rent and acquire necessary supplies not covered through other funding
 - Also part of 501-3(c) nonprofit
- Questions regarding fairness of allowing some nonprofits and not others in building to operate rent-free
- Allan Brown made the motion not to recommend this article. Chair Seidel seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Information Session: Posting of Zoom Recordings

• An article to post video or audio recordings of Select Board, Planning Board, Zoning Board, and Budget Committee

- Could be posted on YouTube rather than directly hosted on the website
 - Embeds or links are options as well
- Amendments could be made from the floor to update technology in article according to the town's plans
- Contingency plans for technological failure are necessary
- Allan Brown made a motion to recommend the article. Faith Minton seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Information Session- Appointed To Elected Planning and Zoning Boards

- Board is reconsidering this article after input from the boards themselves and further consideration
- Other positions of the town with less power- trustees of the library and the cemeteries, Parks and Recare elected
 - Smaller communities are able to elect boards
 - RSAs cover what to do regarding a vacancy
- Select Board reviews qualifications of an appointed board
 - This would not be the case for an elected board
 - Personal agendas could become an issue
 - Processes exist to deal with this
 - The law allows anyone to run for any elected position
 - There has been a history of most appointments being accepted
 - Concerns by board around perception of stacking appointments
 - Appointments tend to be approved
- Possibility of running for office being a deterrent for prospective members
- Difficulty of soliciting volunteers
- Perceived biases of board in appointing officials
- Faith Minton made the motion to remove these articles from the warrant. Chair Seidel seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Information Session- Combined Town Clerk and Tax Collector Position

- Being discussed due to the retirement of the current tax collector
- Due to upcoming revaluation and new software, this may be a difficult time to make the change
 - Defunding tax collector position to a \$30,000 stipend may also be unwise in conjunction with this
 - Onboarding of new tax collector and assessor may not be smooth
- Warrant article regarding tax collector benefits
 - Warrant Article 21 in 2000 guaranteed full benefits and retirement to elected Town Clerk and Tax Collector positions
- There is a need for discussion with individuals in existing positions
 - Job descriptions, wages, and hours must be transparent in order to make an informed decision
- Reduction to \$30,000 is not sufficient to cover current tax collector wages
- Current tax collector position is salaried
 - Hours are not being charged
- Concerns with office space and confidentiality if combined into the Town Clerk's current office
- Concerns with workload for the individual in the position
- Other towns have stated that Avitar's software works well for them and streamlines the workload
 - These statements come from individuals in combined town clerk/tax collector positions in towns nearby Warner, including some that are larger
 - Most of these towns had two people in this office full-time: a town clerk/tax collector and a deputy
 - There may be other staff hired during tax season
- Other staff needing to be hired during busy seasons may reduce savings
- More information needed regarding cost vs. savings

- Concerns from existing staff regarding aggressiveness and speed of change
 - Possibility of moving the combined position out to 2027 and voting in 2026
 - More information still needed
- Chair Seidel made the motion to remove the article from the ballot. Allan Brown seconded the motion, and the motion passed 2-1.
